All the Prisoners Found Guilty.

Payne, Harrold, Atzerodt and Mrs. Surratt to be Hanged To-Day.

Dr. Mudd, Arnold and O'Laughlin to be Imprisoned for Life.

Spangler to be Confined Six Years.

How the Assassins Received the News.

Mrs. Surratt Begs for More Time.

Public opinion in Washington

Washington, Thursday, July 6, 1865.

The published announcements in the evening papers of the hanging of four of the conspirators to-morrow created quite a sensation in town, although every loyal man expressed himself satisfied with the verdict approved by the President.

It was known for several days that the findings were in the hands of the President, but no one anticipated a decision for some time to come, and the promptitude with which he has acted is universally commended.

Many wonder that Spangler was not included among those to suffer the death penalty, and believe him equally culpable with Atzerodt and Harrold.

Preparations for the executions are going forward rapidly, and Gen. Hancock is overwhelmed with applications for admission to the penitentiary grounds. Notwithstanding the request of Mrs. Surratt for additional time, it is not believed that her execution will be

There is a universal feeling of satisfaction here that these abhorred assassins are to meet with such a swift and terrible retribution.

WASHINGTON, Thursday, July 6, 1865.

Major-General Hancock repaired to the Arsenal at moon to-day and delivered the death warrants of Payne, Harrold, Mrs. Surratt and Atzerodt to Maj.-Gen. Hartmanft, who is in charge of the prisoners, when they together visited the condemned to inform them of the mentences pronounced and the time fixed for their execution.

Payne was the first to whom the intelligence was communicated. It did not seem to take him by surprise, as doubtless he anticipated no other sentence and had nerved himself accordingly. The other prisoners were naturally more or less affected. Mrs. Surratt particularly sank under the dread announcement and pleaded for four days additional time to prepare herself for death.

All the prisoners will be attended by clergymen of their own designation. The soaffold has been creeted in the south yard of the old Penitentiary building, which is enclosed by a high brick wall. The coffins and burnal ciches have already been prepared. Only a limited number of persons will be admitted to the scene. The sentences of the conspirators who are to be imprisoned will be carried into immediate effect.

Harold, G. A. Atzerodt, Lewis Payne and Mary E. Surratt, he carried into execution by the proper militury authority, under the direction of the Secretary of War, on the 7th day of July, 1865, between the hours of 10 o'clock a.m. and 2 o'clock p. m. of that day.
