The paper shows that the requisition was originally drawn in favor of Benjamin Wo.d, esq., and that the name of D. S. Eastwood was afterward substituted. Q. State the exact condition of that paper ? A. As it reads now it is a draft on New-York, peyable to the or-der of D. S. Eastwood, that is, myself. Q. State how that change in the requisition occurred? A. The name of Benjamin Wood, as it appeared origin-ally, was erased at Mr. Thompson's request, and my name, as an officer of the bank, was substituted. Q. That is the original paper, is it not ? A. #### Resume of Friday's Evidence.

Witness said that Thompson originally made a requi-sition on that bank for \$25,0.0 in currency in favor of Benjamin Wood, but this was atterward chatged by direction of Mr. Thompson in favor of D S. Eastwood, The draft for this amount was dated August 10, 1864, and was drawn on the City Bank of New York. The back of the draft is thus indersed: "Fay to Hon, Benj. Wood or order. D. S. Eastward, B. Wood."

Wood," George Wilkes and Abraham D. Russell testified as to the signature of B. Wood, and that he was a member of Congress at the time, and is also proprietor of The New York Daily News. The Court then adjourned till
