THE WAR.

Gen. Augur has issued an order directing all paroled prisoners of war in the District of Columbia to report to the Provost-Marshal where the residence of each prisoner, with his name and rank, will be recorded, and none will be allowed to wear Rebel uniform. Each prisoner is directed to report in person, at the office where his name is registered, once in every ten days.

It is reported that when Jeff. Davis heard of Lee's surrender he was at Danville, and that at 9 o'clock the same evening he left for Greensborough, N. C. Before his departure he stated to friends that his destination was Texas, where he proposed to make a last stand.

Since the murder of President Lincoln, it has been directed by Gen. Augur that no one be allowed to pass the pickets or forts encircling Washington, unless on a written pass from headquarters, or when personally known to the officer in charge or command of a fort.

Major-Gen. Canby reports that there were over 150 pieces of artillery found in the works around Mobile, with large quantities of ammunition and war supplies. The prisoners taken number about 1,000, and the cotton secured is about 3,000 bales.

All of Mosby's gang have surrendered except himself; he has fled, and some of his late soldiers are in search of him, prompted by the offer by Gen. Hancock of \$2,000 reward for his capture.
