All forms of religion and all temples of devotion were sacred to nim, and in passing churches he never failed to pare his head reverently. He worsnipped at many shrines; he admired the Koran. and in that volume many beautiful passages are underscored; days sacred to color, ore, and metals, were religiously observed by him. In the synagogues he was known as a Jew, because he conversed with rabbis and learned doctors, and joined their worship in the Hebraic tongue. He read the Talmud and strictly adhered to many of its laws.

Junius Brutus Booth (the Elder) claimed that he was of Jewish decent and a Monotneist, consequently had considerable sympathy with Unitarianism. Page 125
