Dear Mrs Cameron:

Pardon me for not answering your kind letter of June 8th sooner. I was very sorry indeed to hear of Mr Cameron's death. You must miss him greatly.

I'went on down to Enid, Oklahoma. I found that J Walter Robinson whom you knew had died in October 1902, several months before David George came to Enid. Mr Robinson had been the correspondent of the Dramatic Mirror in that section for several years. David George, whose mummy the Bates family have, was never in any way connected with the Mirror. I also obtained sufficient proof to convince us that David George was not John Wilkes Booth. As a matter of fact, since that time additional data which we have procured in Washington quite conclusively proves that Booth died in the Garrett Barn April 26, 1865, as has always been claimed.

I am under the impression that after my return from Enid I wrote you explaining Mr Robinson's lack of connection with the Booth affair. The letter probably went astray. In view of this situation, we feel that the story dealing with your experience with Mr Robinson would not be of particular interest.
