

The Suppressed Testimony.

Relative to the testimony which was suppressed by the Government in the Assassination Trial, *The Philadelphia Inquirer's* Washington dispatch says, the person who is guilty of making public the evidence referred to in imperfect and unsatisfactory form is one Pitman, who has been acting as clerk to Col. Burnett. The correspondent says:

"In doing this he is charged with violating his oath and prostrating his official position for personal gains. His case was discussed in the secret session of the Court, but it is not yet announced what punishment will be visited upon him. One of the witnesses is now in Canada to sell his property and get his family away, and will now have to flee. Another is probably murdered."
