My dear Mr Liebold:

I returned from California about a week or ten days ago and had my first opportunity to examine, and have surgeons and physicians examine, the body. We found no scars on the body except such as you are advised of with the exception of a small scar, about an inch long. The surgeon says it was an incision which had been made in performing an operation on the upper part of the throat for a tubular gland. The surgeon said in examining the crippled foot that it had sustained a compound fracture of the arch and ankle, as clearly shown in the right foot and ankle. This is the extent of a thorough examination of the body.

I am sending you a copy of the Hon. J. C. Burrus' letter, which is self-explanatory. I may add that Burrus is a typical plantation and slave owner prior to the Civil War. Has been a man of affairs in Mississippi for years, having served both in the Legislature and Senate of his State a number of years. A man of education, cultivation and refinement, who now lives where he was born, in a magnificent Colonial home, builded in 1859, by his father. I have a picture of this home and also one of Mr. Burrus.

I will continue securing such kindred evidence as I am sending you.
