Leaden-heeled Law.

Over the body of David E. George, no doubt a suicide, a coroner's jury still deliberates. In the first place a juror was drawn who was not a citizen of this grand republic. He had to be squelched and the evidence gone over again. From Mr. Corry, drug clerk at Watrous-Harley's, it was learned that at twenty minutes before eight o'clock yesterday morning the deceased purchased fifteen grains of strychnine, as he said, "to kill a d--d hound," with. And that previous to that time he had bought five grains of the same poison of Mr. Watrous. The suidie's body was not allowed to be embalmed because it was thought it might be necessary to have an autopsy, until late this forenoon, when the county attorney ordered Penniman to do anything necessary for the preservation of the remains. George's friend, George E. Smith, of Colfax, Ia., telegraphed that he would be here, tomorrow, Thursday, but vouchsafed no further information. No doubt can exist that the demise of Mr. George was premeditated and that the poiston was self-administered. No arrangements for the obsequies will be made until the arrival of Mr. Smith.

The jury came in about 3 o'clock, finding that the deceased came to his death from alcoholic poision, self administered.
