

Booth vs. George

The Incident Closed as far as Undertaker Penniman is Concerned

The Body Disposed Of

For the Present. No one Outside the U. S. Authorities Will View It Again.

Owing to the vast crowds that have haunted the Enid Morgue to look upon the remains of D. E. George alias J. Wilkes Booth through curiosity, the undertaker in charge, Mr. Penniman, was compelled to declare the exhibition of the body a closed incident as far as he was concerned this morning. The body has not been buried, but it has been placed in cold storage out of the morgue.

Nothing particularly new has developed in the case since the last issue of the Wave. If the government has taken any action in the matter, it has not developed here as yet.

Yesterday the last will and testament of David E. George was probated, but as the last act of the deceased was a revocation of said will. It is not worth the paper it is written on. The evidence so far goes to show that the deceased was not possessed of any legitimate estate outside of the contents of his trunk, unless the claimed Knights of Pythias and New York Mutual Life Insurance proves to be good which is now doubted.

The estate of George, alias Booth seemed to exist in his mind or imagination only, which was one of the great characteristics of the ancient and modern members of the Booth family.
