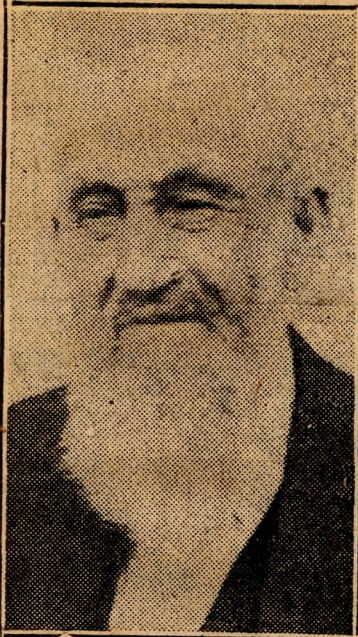


SAW TRAGEDY



Sixty years ago, on the night of April 14, 1865. William H. Hershey, a soldier in the Union forces, witnessed the shooting of Abraham Lincoln in Ford's Theater in Washington. Hershey, now 85 years of age, lives at Dayton, Ind., and is one of the few survivors of the theater audience which witnessed the assassination.

H. R. RATHBONE ON WJJD TUESDAY

Henry R. Rathbone, United States congressman from Illinois (at large), will give a talk from the Loyal Order of Moose station, WJJD, at Mooseheart, Ill., at 7:45 p. m. on Tuesday. He will talk on "Young America."

Mr. Rathbone is a lecturer in the John Marshall Law School of Chicago and at National and American Universities, Washington, D. C., and is an authority on the Constitution of the United States.

His grandfather was Hon. Ira Morris, United States senator from New York during the Civil War and one of President Lincoln's staunchest supporters. His father and mother were also intimate friends of President and Mrs. Lincoln and were in the box at Ford's Theater at the time of Lincoln's assassination. His father, an army officer, was severely injured by Booth when he endeavored to protect the President.
