Around the oval are set twenty-two Moonstones, and the bird's crest contains five Emeralds, with a Garnet for his eye. This panel is most artistically inlaid in various colors on a green levant ground. Interlaced strap-work in brown and purple inlays forms a border to the panel as well as to the cover, on heavily stippled ground. The back cover has a small sunken panel, in which is tooled the Whistler "butterfly," and around it are set four groups of three Garnets each, and four Moonstones. The border to the panel and cover is of interlaced strap-work in brown levant, the cover itself being richly tooled with leaf sprays, with terminals of small circular green inlays. The front doublure has a sunken panel in which is set a Hand-Painted Miniature on Ivory, of Whistler, surrounded by ten Moonstones, set in a band of purple, outside of which are pleasing gilt leaf sprays on a cream ground. This cream levant also forms the doublure, in which are laid wild roses and leaves. The outer border also has peacock feathers, with "eyes" of red. The back doublure is similar in design to the front, except that the sunken panel is entirely a jeweled one, having four elongated Garnets, four Turquoises, and a mother-of-pearl center. The book is laid in a silk- and plush-lined morocco solander case; case slightly worn.
