

Oklahoma City, Okla., January 13, 1921. Interviewed Mrs. E. E. Hahn who was Miss Chester Lowe of El Reno in 1900, 1 and 2, and a friend and frequent visitor of Mrs. W. O. Wheeler who was Miss Simmons, the daughter of J. W. Simmons at that time and of Mrs. Koons who later became Mrs. Harper and is now Mrs. Young. Mrs. Hahn says that she was 20 in 1900 and worked at one of the El Reno stores. That she met George at the Simmons' and that George was partly courting an old maid who worked in the same store with her and was also trying to court Mrs. Koons who didn't care at all for him. Mrs. Hahn says that George walked home with her several times and that she was nice to him because he was an old man and she felt sorry for him. That she thought he had seen better days. She says that he was very intelligent when sober, but drank a lot. She says she heard him talk to himself several times while she was at the Simmons'. She says that Mr. George was very fond of Shakespeare and would quote from him occasionally in a very dramatic manner. She says that as far as she knows Mr. George never had a lot of money and don't think any one ever sent him any and that he painted houses all the time she knew him. Mrs. Hahn says she had not heard of a confession made to Mrs. Harper until she saw it in the papers after George's death, although she always thought there was something strange about the man and wouldn't be surprised if the story was true.
