Dear Mrs Cameron

I certainly was agreeably surprised to receive your letter of July 28th and to learn that you and Mr. Cameron had entered on such interesting and valuable work. I heartily congratulate both you and Mr. Cameron and also the "Home" for I do not know of two people who ought to make a better success of a thing of this kind than you and Mr. Cameron. You both have had excellent opportunities to study human nature, your sympathies are broad, and your personalities are the kind that inspire trust. I certainly would love to spend a few days with you as you suggest and want to assure you of my deepest appreciation for the invitation. Unfortunately, I have all ready taken my vacation for this year so may have to put off such a delightful trip until next summer.

Immediately upon receiving your letter this morning I had our Subscription Department place your library on THE DEARBORN INDEPENDENT mailing list. I am also sending, under separate cover, to Mr. Cameron a copy of the second twenty articles on the Jewish question, which we have reprinted in booklet form.
