Called at George's room in the Grand Avenue Hotel for his laundry twice a week and found him most of the time in bed half drunk and cursing like the dickens. He saw George in the lobby once drunk and the proprietor, Dumont, threatening to fire him out if he did not return to his room and remain quite. He says that a saloonkeeper by the name of ^eBurnstein on the south side of the square would take whiskey to George or send it by his (Burnstein's) son, although against the orders of the hotel; that he, (Wilson), told Dumont about this. He says he never saw George on the streets. He was always in his room or in the lobby. He says George's hair was gray, but not quite so much as Robison's. That George had a big mustache and Robison none. He says that George seemed to be quite ill during the entire time that he was in Enid.
